Sympathy to the family

Is Video Relay Service (VRS) important to you?

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) is considering a new rate for the payment of VRS services effective July 1, 2004. The FCC has already lowered the rate last year, which has led to numerous and ongoing consumer complaints about the deteriorating quality of VRS. This includes a cutback in VRS hours, long waits before a VRS interpreter becomes available, insufficient level of improvement in VRS technology, and lower quality of VRS interpreters.

The FCC will be developing a new cost recovery methodology system for VRS. This means that the FCC will come up with a new system for figuring out how much it actually costs to provide VRS. It makes no sense for the FCC to further reduce reimbursement rates before they finish the development of the new system. Limited funding also makes it much harder for companies to improve VRS and give us clearer video picture, wireless access, and Macintosh compatibility. The FCC has also rejected reimbursement for video mail. Video mail is important because it gives Deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals access to telecommunication answering services and equipment.

3 things you should do.

1. Go to the FCC website and let the FCC know how much you value VRS and it's impact on your life.
 - a. Type this address on your Web Browser :

http://gullfoss2.fcc.gov/prod/edfs/upload_v2.cgi

- b. Fill out the form in full (except for those identified as "optional.") Make sure item number 1 is entered in as 98-67.
 - c. Make sure item number 12 says "comment." If not, scroll down the menu to get "comment."
 - d. jump down to the second option; "Send a Brief Comment to FCC (typed-in)."
 - e. Type in your comments inside the box under "Send a Brief Comment to FCC (typed-in)." Be sure to hit enter to move down to the next line after about 70 characters. The box does not have word-wrap. See below for samples.
 - f. click on "Send Brief Comment to FCC."
2. Contact Congress at <http://congress.org/congressorg/home/>.
 - a. Enter your zip code.
 - b. Click on e-mail link for your Senator and Representatives.
 - c. Fill out the form.
 - d. Type your comments. See below for samples.
 3. Sign the petition for VRS at <http://64.6.180.168/petition/>.

You are welcome to use any one of the following samples for your comments.

Sample 1:

I have suffered from a deteriorating quality of Video Relay Services (VRS). Please ensure that the FCC makes no further reductions in the VRS interim rate until VRS functional equivalency is achieved, including the completion of the FCC's process for determining the cost recovery methodology, and until VRS

is available 24/7 with high quality interpreters and reasonable average speed of answer. Please also reconsider reimbursement of video mail, as I need a way for hearing people to leave me a message.

Sample 2:

Video Relay Services (VRS) is wonderful to use. I want to see it become an important real-time communication service. The VRS is for me closer to functional equivalency than other telecommunications services. Please do not allow the FCC to further reduce the VRS rate of reimbursement until it become available 24/7 with high quality services and accessibility. Please also overturn the FCC's decision refusing reimbursement for video mail.

Sample 3:

I have seen a decrease in VRS quality and availability. I need VRS to be able to have full telecommunication access at home and at work. Please make no more cuts in the VRS rate until functional equivalency is achieved and until video mail is made available.

The National Video Relay Service Coalition

About the National Video Relay Service Coalition: This ad-hoc coalition was formed in response to consumer concerns about the quality of VRS. Representatives on this coalition include: American Association of People with Disabilities (AAPD), Association of Late-Deafened Adults (ALDA, California Coalition of Agencies Serving the Deaf (CCASD), Deaf and Hard of Hearing Consumer Advocacy Network (DHHCAN), Deaf and Hard of Hearing in Government (DHHIG), and National Association of the Deaf (NAD).

Two women die in fire at Eau Claire Home

Worn copper wire in wall blamed for blaze

Editorial Note: This is reprinted from The State newspaper which was published on March 26, 2004. Samantha Huyghue was known by Midlands' Deaf young people. Samantha attended to Deaf program at local schools and graduated.

An Eau Claire woman and her handicapped daughter on Thursday became Columbia's first victims of a fatal fire in 2004.

Bertha M. Huyghue, 61, and 27-year-old Samantha Huyghue (Pronounced Huey) died of smoke inhalation in a fire reported at 2:17 a.m. at 4411 Hawthorne Ave. in the Burneswood subdivision near Eau Claire High School, authorities said.

A worn copper wire in the small frame house sparked the fire when it touched a metal sewer pipe inside a bedroom wall, said Assistant Fire Chief Joe Floyd.

Dean Huyghue said he has lost a fiercely independent daughter; another daughter was unharmed because she spent the day helping him at his nearby home.

"That was my doll," Huyghue, 51, said Thursday outside the damaged home where his estranged wife and two daughters lived.

"She never really wanted to use a wheelchair," Dean Huyghue said of Samantha. "She was very

independent for being handicapped."

The fire started in the bedroom of Samantha's sister, Art Huyghue. Art Huyghue spent the day and night at Dean Huyghue's home a couple of miles away. He had facial surgery Wednesday. His head was wrapped in bandages Thursday as he surveyed the remains of the Hawthorne Avenue house.

Floyd, the fire official, said super-heated gases flooded Bertha Huyghue when she opened the door to the bedroom she shared with Samantha Huyghue.

The daughter rolled out of bed but apparently was quickly overcome as well, Floyd said. Samantha Huyghue was found face down beside the bed. Her crutches was nearby.

The house, estimated to be 60 years old, was equipped with a handicap ramp but had no smoke detector, fire officials said.

The Huyghues became the first people to die in fire in Columbia since June 14, 2003, when a man died in a car fire, city records indicate.

The accidental fire caused \$35,000 damage.

Dean and Bertha Huyghue had four children and have been separated eight years, he said.

"We couldn't get along," he said. "But she was a nice person, and she took care of her children."

Neighbor Charlie Edwards, 61, said he has known the family for 20 years.

Bertha Huyghue took care of Samantha "her whole life."

Samantha Huyghue never worked, but she liked going to "handicap school," where she learned skills for daily living, Edward and Dean Huyghue said.

Bertha Huyghue cared for Edwards' family, too.

"Ever since I've been knowing her, she helped my children—take them to the store and cook and bring meals," Edwards said. "She shared with us ... with her friends."

His mother suffered a broken hip when she fell and the family had planned to move her to Georgia to stay with one of his brothers, but Mama said "nothing doing". I can imagine how she felt not wanting to leave her home as being independent is very important to me, too.

When Tom left, my oldest son Johnny tried to get me out of this house out of concern of me being alone, but "nothing doing" here, too. We oldies love our independence.

With computers, TDD, email, fax machines, the deafies are keeping the wires hot; there isn't much I can say that you all don't already know. It's said that the deaf "hear" news faster than the hearing do. Is that so??

As I said at the beginning, the 3 "R's" and my dislike for Rithmetic, it's a miracle my bank book is always up-to-date with a little left over, not bad for someone who can only add and subtract (Smile) with a 9th grade education.
